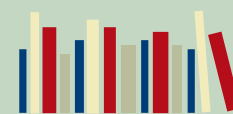

A CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE Governor's Awards in the Humanities

THC^{SC} requests nominations for the annual Governor's Award in the Humanities

Established in 1991, the Governor's Awards in the Humanities recognize outstanding achievement in humanities research, teaching, and scholarship; institutional and individual participation in helping communities in South Carolina better understand our cultural heritage or ideas and issues related to the humanities; excellence defining South Carolina's cultural life to the nation or world; and exemplary support for public humanities programs. Fifty-three individuals and organizations have received awards between 1991 and 2009. For a complete list of past Governor's Award in the Humanities winners, please contact the office or see the Web site at www.schumanities.org. The Humanities Council^{SC} is in its 37th year as the state affiliate program of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Residents of South Carolina or organizations and institutions that operate within the state whose efforts have strengthened the humanities in this state are eligible. Categories in which nominations are welcome include: The Lifetime Achievement Award, for an individual who has demonstrated exemplary support for public humanities programs on the local and/or state level over a significant period of time; The Distinctive Achievement Award, for an individual who best defines South Carolina's cultural life to

the nation or to the world; The Academic Achievement Award, for an individual responsible for significant work in teaching, research, or scholarship in one or more of the humanities disciplines; The Community Leadership & Support Award, for an institution, business, or individual that creates or participates in community-based programs that promote public understanding of ideas and issues related to the humanities; The Public Humanities Award, for an individual practitioner responsible for outstanding public humanities programs in libraries, museums, historical societies, or other cultural institutions; and The Volunteer Achievement Award, for an individual who has contributed to increasing the understanding of our cultural heritage and values in the community, region, or state through public program participation.

The THC^{SC} Board of Directors will choose the nominees who best exemplify the above criteria. Awards may be given in any, all, or none of the categories. **Individuals, groups, or institutions may send a letter of nomination attention to Dr. Randy Akers, THC^{SC}, PO Box 5287, Columbia SC 29250 by June 30, 2010.** Nomination letters may be up to three pages in length and should describe the contributions of the nominee. Individuals, organizations, or institutions may not nominate themselves.



A CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE Board of Directors

The Humanities Council^{SC} invites nominations for its Board of Directors. The Council operates as a tax-exempt, non-profit corporation granting funds received from federal (National Endowment of the Humanities), corporate, state, and private sources. The Board of Directors consists of twenty-four volunteer academic and public members. New members will begin three-year terms in November 2010. Board members initiate and develop projects, seek to make the humanities accessible statewide, and take active roles in Council fundraising. Board members attend three meetings per year; evaluate grant proposals; serve on committees; determine policy and Council directives; and oversee financial responsibility. Nominees should be supportive of THC^{SC}'s mission and goals; interested in the humanities; dedicated to public service; and committed to providing cultural enrichment opportunities for South Carolinians.

Letters of nomination should include the name, telephone, email and address of the nominee and a brief description of why the person should serve on the Board of Directors, including experience and interest in public humanities programming. A vita or resume should be included. Additionally, the nominee should write a letter of interest to be included with the nomination. The THC^{SC} chairperson will notify successful candidates. **Nominations should be sent to THC^{SC}, PO Box 5287, Columbia SC 29250, no later than June 30, 2010.**



Schedule Announced for South Carolina's *New Harmonies: Celebrating American Roots Music*

New Harmonies is a traveling Smithsonian exhibit that explores Americans' creative expression through music – music known by names like blues, country western, folk ballads, and gospel.

New Harmonies will tour South Carolina from April 2011 – January 2013 and will visit 12 South Carolina communities. Developed as part of the Museum on Main Street program, this exhibit is designed especially for small museums and rural audiences that lack regular access to traveling exhibitions.

At each stop on the statewide tour, *New Harmonies* will be accompanied by local programming, from musical performances to workshops to lectures about local music traditions.

New Harmonies is made possible in South Carolina by The Humanities Council^{SC}. *New Harmonies* is part of Museum on Main Street, a collaboration between the Smithsonian Institution and state humanities councils nationwide. 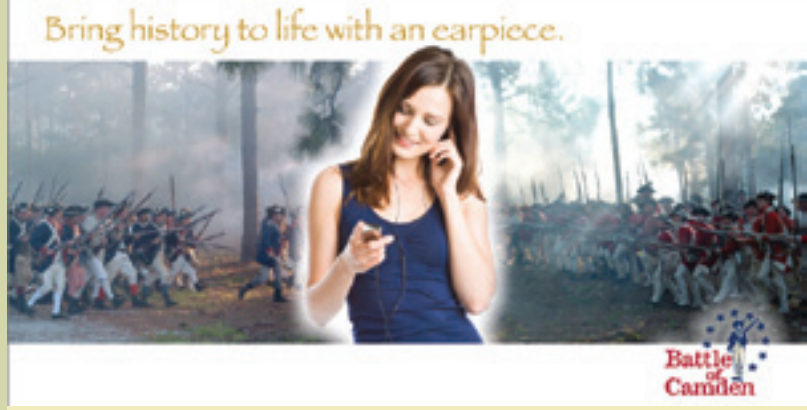

Battle of Camden Podcast

Podcast About the Battle of Camden Brings South Carolina History Alive!

Hear history come alive as cannons roar and commanders bark orders. Listen to the words of men and women, British and American, talk about the battle that forever changed the way we fought. The Battle of Camden podcast engages visitors in the story of that pivotal day in August 1780.

The worst field defeat of the American army during the Revolutionary War took place on the Great Wagon Road six miles north of present day Camden, SC. Generals Cornwallis and Gates made their marks here – the high water mark for British power in the colonies and a reputation shattering defeat for Gates.

Palmetto Conservation Foundation (PCF), owner of 476 acres of the core battlefield, has received grant funds from the National Park Service to preserve and restore this National Historic Landmark. Efforts have been underway for several years to restore the landscape to the conditions of 1780 – a longleaf pine and wiregrass ecosystem. Archaeological research has unearthed over 1000 artifacts that better establish the battle lines. New hiking trails and interpretive signs guide visitors around the battlefield to the places where the night battle occurred; the militia fled; Gen. De Kalb fought valiantly; and Col. Tarleton pursued the Americans, capturing and killing hundreds.

To enhance the interpretation program at the Battle of Camden site and to attract younger visitors, PCF applied to and received a grant from The Humanities Council^{SC} to create a podcast. Dr. Jim Piecuch, assistant professor at Kennesaw State University and author of *The Battle of Camden: A Documentary History*, wrote the script that expands upon the information on the 11 waysides and kiosk. Three Rivers Media produced the podcast which can be downloaded at www.palmettoconservation.org and numerous other sites. Rack cards promoting the podcast are available at state welcome centers and tourism displays in Camden. Spreading the word to teachers about the podcast availability is ongoing.

The use of technology is particularly attractive and effective in bringing the stories of our heritage to younger generations. It is PCF's hope that these tales of sacrifice to forge an independent nation will inspire more visitations to battlefields across the state. The Humanities Council^{SC} is proud to be a part of this exciting project.



Let's Talk About It is not your average book club. Connecting interested readers with classic literature, resonant themes, and scholarly interpretation, Let's Talk About It creates an exciting classroom-style discussion forum where ideas and insights abound. The Humanities Council^{SC} partners with the South Carolina State Library to make these series available to libraries and other nonprofit organizations. The Humanities Council^{SC} makes \$500 grants available to participating organizations to pay for scholar honoraria; the SC State Library provides complete sets of books. 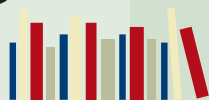
